The Self-Righteousness of Young-Earth Ministries By Greg Neyman © Answers In Creation



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I recently read a letter on the Answers in Genesis website, in which Ken Ham talks about the present day church, and the efforts of the church to embrace new technologies to advance the Gospel. ¹ In short, he claims that these high-tech efforts amount to nothing more than a "band-aid," meant to fix an ailing church.

It is true that today's church is ailing. One only needs to look at how the church is losing its influence in American society, from the removal of the Ten Commandments in public places, to the banning of prayer during school functions, to the rampant, misleading lawsuits filed by the American Civil Liberties Union.
